OUR GOALS


The Central Council of Oriental Christians in Germany is a charitable association of Christians living in Germany who belong to the Oriental Churches.

It was founded on 18th March 2013 in Munich.



OUR GOALS: TOLERANCE AND LOVE OF NEIGHBOUR

One of the main objectives of the Central Council of Oriental Christians in Germany is to maintain a respectful exchange with religions, traditions and cultures, based on the values of the love of neighbour, tolerance and particularly the open, factual as well as critical dialogue.





OUR GOALS: DEMOCRACY

We Oriental Christians see democracy with all its rights and duties as a system of government which equally facilitates opportunities to the people independently of their faith, origin or culture. The integration in this frame of values is an essential component of our duties. To integrate means to us to participate in a society shaped by variety.





OUR GOALS: INTEGRATION

Promoting integration in a humanistic society in which all citizens have a place, independently from their gender, religion or ethnic origin.

In consideration of the values and standards of pluralism. Based on the principle of the love of neighbour.

However also critical in the dialogue with anti-democratic tendencies.





OUR GOALS: FREEDOM OF RELIGION

We stand for similar rights in the countries of origin. Especially the freedom of religion and the change of religion, the freedom of expression and equal rights of men and women are essential for us.





OUR GOALS: BRIDGE BUILDERS

We see it as our duty to encounter the division of the society by extremists and populists of every shade. Especially us who have always been bridge builders between the Fast and the West can take over an important role here. Particularly the relationship between every single person and patriarchal authoritative structures are in the focus authorized religiously lead to parallel societies.





OUR GOALS: ECUMENISM


A vital variety of churches leaves a margin for new ideas and promotes tolerance. This has not always been like that in the past. In Germany a new young generation is following such developments precisely at the moment.





OUR GOALS: WOMEN'S RIGHTS

The value of women in patriarchal structures is far away from our understanding of equality between men and women in modern societies which is often religiously authorised. Reduced to traditional functions e.g. the role as a mother, sister and wife on whose "purity" the clan defines its honour, she is discriminated as the weakest limp of a society, often misused in contexts of war in order to humiliate and weaken opponents.












Development



After 1990 and the Second and Third Gulf War





Through different migration programs but also illegal/legal escape more and more Christians from Iraq (Bagdad, the Niniveh Plains, Assyrians, Chaldeans) found a new home in Augsburg.


The structure of the church communities has also changed. Eastern Syrian and Arabic are being spoken more often.

Syria



Approximately 40 % to 50 % of all Christians have left the region.
Unlike Iraq and Turkey (see slides above), Syria has a much larger variety of churches.

The impact on the churches in Germany and also Augsburg are accordingly much bigger.

The Eucharistic communities become more heterogeneous.
